The site is situated in Folldal and Stor-Elvdal municipalities, Hedmark County and in Sør-Fron municipality in Oppland County. The nearest towns are Lillehammer, Oppland County, appr. 110 km away and Hamar, Hedmark County, appr. 170 km away. Hamar has approximate 28600 inhabitants and Lillehammer approximate 26500 inhabitants.

Atnsjømyrene is a mire-complex in which the flat fens are dominant. In addition, there are some pools and ponds. The Nature Reserve also includes parts of a big lake, Atnsjøen. Atnsjømyrene is an important breeding area for wetland birds.

Criterion 1

A large mire-complex with pools and ponds and edge vegetation, typical and representative for the continental part of southern Norway. The number of plant species is relatively low, due to the poor nutrient conditions, but are characteristic of the biogeographic region.

Criterion 3

A great variety of wetland bird species are breeding within the area, some of them are regionally rare. The birdlife is typical for large mires and small open water bodies in this part of Norway. The wetland system is important for maintaining the biological diversity in the region.

Criterion 4

A great variety of wetland bird species are breeding within the area, some of them are regionally rare. Some few pairs of Common Crane *Grus grus* are breeding regularly in Atnsjømyrene Nature Reserve. Many waders are breeding in the area. The most common species are Common Snipe *Gallinago gallinago*, Red-necked Phalaropus *lobatus*, Greenshank *Tringa nebularia*, Redshank *Tringa totanus*, Wood Sandpiper *Tringa glareola*, Northern Lapwing *Vanellus vanellus* (NT) and Common Sandpiper *Actitis hypoleucos*. The most common breeding duck species are Common Teal *Anas crecca*, Common Goldeneye *Bucephala clangula*, Tufted Duck *Aythya fuligula* and Mallard *Anas platyrhynchos*. Eurasian Wigeon *Anas penelope* and Goosander *Mergus merganser* occur but are less common. Totally 22-39 pair of ducks and 14-54 pair of waders breed yearly (Sonerud 1982) depending on water level, weather conditions, population fluctuations e.g.

Yellow Wagtail Motacilla flava, Meadow Pipit Anthus pratensis and Reed Bunting Emberiza schoeniclus breed on the large open mires. The birch forest near the water courses has a rich passerine avifauna. Willow

Warbler *Phylloscopus trochilus*, Brambling *Fringilla montifringilla* and Reed Bunting *Emberiza schoeniclus* are the most common species.

Atna river is a central nature element in the site. The river begins in the high mountains of Rondane and flows into Glomma, the longest river in Norway.

Large mires are important water reservoirs. They provide stability in water drainage in the watercourses by acting as reservoirs in drought periods and as flood barriers during snow melt and period of heavy precipitation.

20. General ecological features:

Characteristic for the area is large open mires with nutrient-poor vegetation. Willow *Salix*-woodland and Birch *Betula*-woodland are common vegetation types along watercourses and edges of mires. The mixture of open mires, pools, ponds, rivers and lakes make the site a valuable breeding area for wetland birds, especially for ducks and waders.

No botanical findings of special interest are known.

Northern Lapwing *Vanellus vanellus* (NT) breeds on Atnsjømyrene. Black-throated Diver *Gavia arctica* (NT) and Velvet Scoter *Melanitta fusca* (NT) are observed in the area. Few of the other regularly registered bird species on Atnsjømyrene are endangered, unique or of special biogeographical importance.
